MSU/Sparrow/Family Medicine/Psychiatry Integrated Clinic

- a. This is a required one half day per week outpatient clinic for two 4-week blocks. This rotation is completed at the onset of the outpatient psychiatry rotation, usually during the PGY-3 year.
- b. Faculty consist of a jointly appointed psychiatrist/family medicine physician from the Departments of Family Medicine and Psychiatry at Michigan State University. The residents also work with a full-time social worker, nurses, family medicine residents and staff of the Family Medicine Residency.
- c. Residents spend 5 hours in seminars and case conferences at MSU. In addition, four 1 hour MSU Psychiatry Clinic conferences are held for clinic residents each Monday morning. The residents also attend a weekly noon meeting with the family medicine residents, social worker and attending physician.
- d. The patient population treated parallels the community ratios with approximately 50% female, 50% male, 60% white, 30% African American, 7% Hispanic and 3% Asian. In the Family Practice setting the majority of patients seen are ambulatory.
- e. An average caseload consists of one initial consult per day and 2-5 follow-up visits.
- f. Residents continue to have 2 hours of weekly individual supervision with their psychiatry supervisors outside of this rotation. On the rotation they are working directly with the attending physician.
- g. This is an integrated professional education clinic aimed at fostering the collaboration between family medicine and psychiatry in order to better serve the patients in our community.
